Big Shoes, a Big Fish and a Big Promise

ur current situation at South Parade has changed over this past month quite dramatically, we are now living in a post-Brian era and this period of time in church life will be both interesting and challenging as everyone pulls together to fill some very big shoes left by both Brian and Elsie.

I commenced my own personal journey of transition slightly earlier, as I took on the role (alongside my job share companion Steve Cooper) as Church Administrator for Hannah Preston's maternity cover. I have been in the role since late



November and feel this is now an appropriate time for reflection.

It has been interesting to view the church which I have loved and belonged to for the past six years, from a different perspective, the privilege to see it from the inside out through joining the Ministry Team, rather than glimpses of the wider work through occasional participation with the children and young people's work, leading a few times at Sent and volunteering for a month with the church office.

This has however come with a price of sacrifice to home life (I was previously with little Lucy every day at home and now have the challenge of adapting to childcare provision, fostering a working relationship built on trust with our childminder to care for and nurture Lucy).

In this I have had to rely on Jesus' leading in my life, walking with him and trusting that this is the right path. Especially as my career has always revolved around secular Youth Services and now I find myself in the uncharted territory of church administration. I would have laughed loudly in my familiar Essex girl laugh had you told me a year ago this is where I would be, and that I would believe it is the perfect fit would have been even funnier to me. However God's call was very strong and loud and undeniable when it came.

o close friends I have previously described myself as someone who is more like Jonah than Noah. I admire Noah's character and his determination to keep building that ark, even in the

sunshine whilst facing adversity and ridicule, all the while knowing that God's purpose for him was clear. I am not at all like this, instead I chose to be disobedient and conceited, to say no not me God, I have a different calling and take the route via the big fish to eventually end up where God wants me to be.

When I first knew Hannah's role would need covering, I felt a sense that I should apply for it, but I made terrible excuses about not wanting to work in the place where I worship and that I lacked the skills for the role. Truthfully I was terrified of failure, either in securing the role or being inadequate and thus both leading to rejection.

ventually after a slightly painful rebuking period I came to the realisation that as church members and regular attenders, we all in fact should be working where we worship and actually the longer I am in this role, the more I realise that some of the most diligent and hardworking people we have

involved in South Parade are in fact providing their

time on a voluntary basis and juggling their other priorities to further God's kingdom in this place.

As for the skills I rely on God to provide what I need and the support of those around me and it seems to be going really well. I am still enjoying church life as a member and being involved has only increased my love for South Parade rather than as I once feared diminished it.

Joshua 1.9 says "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go."

I have printed this out and put it on my desk at work and I am trying to live faithfully in the knowledge of this. I encourage you, in this time of transition and uncertainty in the future, be strong and courageous in our Lord as he seeks to use you for his purposes. It might be slightly unnerving and you are sure to be out of your comfort zone, but together through prayer and drawing close to our Lord and Saviour we will work it out.

Church Meeting Notes

Members met in the Green House on 28 January and Paul Rockley led a time of worship and prayer, and chaired the meeting.

Church Treasure(r) Adrian Howe presented members with information on the 2016 budget. With fancy diagrams ("the grey quadrilateral", multiple coloured heptagons and a fuel-gauge indicator) he explained that giving would have to increase by 7% for the budget to balance over the course of the year, and increase further when a new Senior Minister is in post.

Members were challenged to communicate the vision of the church, and to share stories of all that God was doing through the Mission Communities, the Ministry Team and all the activities of the church. A legacy left by a church member who died last year will be an addition to church funds. The shortfall of the Baptist Pension Scheme (for retired ministers) is also a consideration for the future.

The church affirmed its commitment to its Safeguarding policy. Heather McLeen outlined the purpose behind Safe to Grow in protecting and nurturing the children the church has contact with, and she explained the new

Safe to Belong policy which extends safeguarding to Adults at Risk. Extra DBS checks for some people will need to be done to meet this policy.

Church Secretary Charles Fletcher gave details of new members who

have ioined the church recently. He is currently reviewing the membership list, and the meeting agreed to remove members from the list who we have not had contact with for some time. Others who we are in contact with but have moved away or are no longer in regular fellowship with us will be sent letters to see if they wish their membership of the church to continue.



Connect Mission Community have seen two baptisms this year - Josh and Kirsty. We met both of these amazing people through the very first contact we had with the Women's Refuge about six years ago. We feel that there are many more individuals who we pray will also take the step to be Baptised in 2016! However, the verse that says "The fields are white with harvest but the workers are few" seems very poignant to us! Please do pray for Connect Mission community - praise God for the many children and adults who are hearing about Jesus and join us in praying that God would strengthen the Connect team and therefore our ability to connect with the individuals that are beginning to belong to our church!

The church's position on baptism and church membership was explained with the help of a document Brian had prepared. Friends and attenders who are not currently members of the church will be given the opportunity to join the email distribution list to receive updates about meetings and other church news. We were reminded that church meetings are open to anyone who wishes to attend (though only church members are allowed to vote). The proposed meeting dates for the rest of the year are on page 36.

Farewell Brian and Elsie

After ten years of faithful, fruitful and unforgettable ministry the time had come for Brian and Elsie to move on to a well deserved retirement. It wasn't going to be easy. Even up to the final days Brian was doing all he could to leave us in good heart, well organised and ready to carry on.

ow could we adequately thank them for all that they had done for us? We couldn't but we had a good try. The Saturday evening began with a rousing chorus of *Happy Birthday To You* as we remembered that the weekend of 9-10 January not only marked the end of Brian and Elsie's ten years at South Parade, and the formal end of Brian's full-time ministry, but also the occasion of his 65th birthday.

The church was packed out with people ready to enjoy food and fun but with some tears. How many to cater for? No idea. There had been mutterings about bringing in pizzas but no, under the brilliant organisation of John and Ann Pelham, South Parade rose to the occasion and with a lot of help from all five corners of the church a feast was laid out for all to enjoy. We couldn't let Elsie go with anything less after all the wonderful catering she had done for us. The instructions for queuing for food were soon abandoned as more and more friends poured through the doors and the room filled up.

The rest of the evening was given over to showing our appreciation of their ministry with us. The highlights of the evening included a delightful African worship song led by friends from New City of David; a fiendish quiz on the history of Connect/Four with a suitable prize; and a presentation from the Ministry Team, who all happened to come from the various areas in which Brian has lived, trained or worked and were able to translate well known phrases into their different dialects.

A big thank you goes to Colin Jones as Master of Ceremonies who managed to persuade or hijack people into taking part, even with Christmas coming in the middle of the preparations. He also penned a reworking of *When I'm* 64 poking fun at Brian's leading style ("loos to the right there - your right, my left drinks are served after"), his magical skill with calming babies at dedications, as well as his love of certain four-wheel-drive vehicles ("don't run us over in your Land Rover just 'cause you're retired") (you probably had to be there).

ach mission community expressed its thanks in its own way. Geoff Parks quizzed

Brian on how he would be spending his retirement. It seems that he will be happily walking around the Derbyshire countryside and getting into the DIY jobs, but it looks as though the gardening will be left to Elsie. Whether they get a dog or not remains to be seen. It was good to hear from Brian and Elsie's family about what it was like growing up as children of the "manse". Brian said the evening was like being present at his own funeral tea.

Church Secretary Charles Fletcher brought gifts from the whole church including a cheque, flowers and advice on retirement. A scrap book containing thanks from individuals, children, small groups and church organisations together with photos will, hopefully, be a tangible way of remembering us. One child perhaps summed it all up when he wrote "Thank you Brian, you have been a god pastor".

At Brian's final service at Headingley Morning on the following day tissues were freely available at the front of the church for all those needing them. Children and young people from Junior Church read prayers for Brian and Elsie that they had written, and a verse of It's Not the Roof was rewritten to say "We say goodbye Brian and Elsie/God Bless you both, we all agree/From South Parade in Headingley". In traditional South Parade style Brian and Elsie stood in the middle of the church as they were prayed for.

n the evening service friends from Brian's previous churches, and other churches in Headingley joined the worship. During an "open mic" session, many people spoke about how Brian had helped them to grow and strengthen their faith in Jesus. Dorothy Gazey, representing Headingley Churches Together spoke of Brian's contribution to that group and how his ideas and energy will be missed, particularly in the Good Friday united witness event. Graham Ensor talked about Brian's contribution to the Yorkshire Baptist Association and the wider Baptist family.

Brian preached on Paul's farewell to the Ephesians in Acts 20: both sermons from the day are available to download from the church website. As a surprise to Brian and Elsie a specially convened SP choir sang John Rutter's exquisite setting of the blessing *The Lord Bless You* and Keep You: it was a fitting end to a long and emotional weekend. s we continue the process of seeking a new Senior Minister, we thank God for the legacy of Brian's ministry amongst us: lives changed through the Holy Spirit; Mission Communities emboldened to seek and serve the lost, the last and the least; and a church united in its desire to build community in Christ.



Italy Update

Our last newsletter of the year always seems sad as it has that finality feeling of yet another year gone. However, that is the only sad part because we have had together with you a wonderful year here at Reggio.



The church continues to grow slowly - spiritually and numerically. Our work with the immigrants here at Reggio and at Rosarno goes on but because of a terrorist threat here, the boats that arrive here with the immigrants are being

blocked. In addition, we have to take into consideration that the sea in the winter is not so easy to navigate for the small boats that most of them come in. Unfortunately, many are still taking the risk.

Our food bank situation has still not changed and we are not getting a lot of food to give out. Thanks to donations, we have been able to add three or four items to what they get from the EU food bank. This Christmas we hope to double those four items to eight due to the generosity of our donors.

We thank God for you all who continually pray and support us through BMS. We will be coming for our home assignment as usual in May and we may be able to see you then.

Prayer points:

- Praise God for the continual spiritual and numerical growth in the church.
- Pray for our new project (four house groups) who will meet once a month for prayer, study and evangelism.
- Pray for Rosarno and all the other refugees who are here and who pass by.
- The Food Bank. The food runs on the Monday and Friday to the homeless.
- The advice centre.

If the CAP Fits

Job Club at South Parade

South Parade has quite close connections with Christians Against Poverty (CAP), the debt management and support charity based in Bradford. One of the complementary activities for the charity is helping people to get back into employment, through CAP Job Clubs. Richard Sykes explains how he's been helping with the South Parade Job Club and how we can all support the work.

here are four CAP Job Clubs in the Leeds area and Lawrence Cockrill is the Job Coach for the club closest to us, at Bramley. There is a six week course, delivered over a couple of hours each week, designed to increase the participants' confidence and improve the skills that they will find useful to successfully navigate the steps to a new job.

I've been going to the Bramley Job Club since October last year, to help CAP and Job Club are real applications of practical Christianity

Lawrence deliver the course. From my experience, I would say that it's much more than just a teaching / learning process about getting a job. The kinds of people who require this type of help are also more likely to have challenges in other areas of life.

One particular member and reliable attendee worked in the warehouse of an engineering firm for 29 years. He was made redundant soon after the company changed ownership in



recent years. His job searching during last year was impacted by the demands of caring for his elderly and unwell mother, who sadly passed away just before Christmas. He feels that his numeracy, literacy and computer skills are below average and sees the increasing trend of on-line application processes for jobs to be a real

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challenge. Against this background, he has really appreciated the support of the group, without which it could have been much more difficult to face life after the loss of his mother.

CAP and Job Club are real applications of practical Christianity. Jesus was sometimes described as being moved with compassion for the people because they were like sheep without a shepherd. Jesus was able to meet the needs of the people he had dealings with. The members of Job Club may have come in need of a job but, together, find their needs are quite different and have shifting priorities to be dealt with. So Lawrence may start by wearing his Job Coach cap and find he has to change it for a bereavement counsellor cap, a relationship coach cap, an IT / WIFI expert cap, etc, etc.

Please look out for details of the semi-regular CAP related meetings that take place at South Parade. They are at least an opportunity to hear the moving stories of people who find themselves in situations of crippling debt and to be able to engage in prayer for them. They're also a chance to see if CAP have a cap that would fit you nicely.

Chad: Look at what you've done!

Thanks to your generous giving, the new maternal health centre at Guinebor II Hospital (G2) is built and looks set not only to save lives but to transform a desert community.

n summer 2014, we asked you to help us build a maternal health centre at G2 in Chad so that the staff could provide a better service of care to mothers and babies in a country with one of the worst infant and maternal mortality rates in the world. You gave gifts and fundraised to help us reach our target. And we did! UK Christians raised £165,000, which not only paid for the centre but also paid for equipment and furniture to set up the centre, and personnel costs too.

We are pleased to announce that the maternity centre opened in November. BMS World Mission workers Malc and Sue White saw the maternal health centre rise up from nothing in March 2015 to its completion five months later in August. Malc, as the hospital's Chief Operating Officer, was instrumental in organising the building's construction and agreeing a contract with local Christian builder Aaron.

Different people, around 100 in all, were picked from nearby villages, many of them with specialist skills like plumbing, installing solar panels and making bricks and cement. All helped to build the new centre.

One hospital is making a huge impact

G2 has been increasing its health education efforts in the community while building the centre. Two midwives have gone out to local villages and have taught women about the importance of good antenatal care, getting their vaccinations, having regular check-ups and ultimately giving birth at the hospital in a safe



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environment. One hospital is making a huge impact. G2 was once just desert. Look what it has become, thanks to your giving.

Top Five Tips for Surviving in the Amazon

Think you have what it takes to do mission in Peru's Amazon rainforest?

Barborn MS World Mission workers Laura-Lee Lovering and Sarah McArthur have found that living in Nauta in the Peruvian Amazon is full of opportunities to enjoy the beauty of creation and to share the love of Jesus. But it's not without challenges. Here are Laura and Sarah's top five survival tips:

- Learn Spanish. If you can't speak Spanish (and you are not exceptionally good at mime) no one will understand you. So get practising, ¿si?
- Expect to eat the unexpected. Monkey brain, grubs,



guinea pig, and fish soup for breakfast are just a few of the delicacies you will be sampling in Peru's Amazon rainforest.

- Cultivate your extrovert qualities. Don't think you have what it takes to be a solo singer? In Peru it doesn't matter. People like to hear English songs and will almost definitely ask you to sing one. So rehearse one before you go and be ready to sing your little heart out.
- Embrace losing your personal space and privacy. Visits at six in the morning, a warm "buenos dias" with a kiss, and hand-holding when having a conversation – just a few of the things you can expect from your friends and from strangers in Peru.
- Be ready for your 5 am wake-up call. And if possible, develop your love of 90s power ballads. They, along with the chickens, will be playing at full blast from dawn.

Laura and Sarah are part of a team at the Nauta Integral Mission Training Centre in the Loreto region of Peru. Alongside their Peruvian colleagues, they are working to provide training and hospitality to pastors from rural river communities. Climate Change, Floods and Famine

John Lockwood looks at the Biblical history of calamitous famines and floods, and invites us to examine our own lives in the light of our responsibility to care for God's earth.

ast year marked the first time in history that average land and sea surface temperatures surged one full degree Celsius beyond those of the 19th century. World leaders agreed in December at an international conference in Paris to keep the temperature rise above 19th century levels at the end of this century to 2 degrees Celsius. We are already half way to this target. Associated with increasing temperatures are rising sea levels, so many small island states thought that the temperature rise should be 1.5 degrees C.

Floods affect more people than all other natural disasters combined. Warm air holds more moisture than cold, and therefore is associated with more intense rainfall. This winter we have seen across Northern England the flooding caused by record rainfall amounts. Bangladesh is particularly prone to flooding. It is estimated that a I metre rise in sea level, which is likely to be reached by the end of this century, due to the effects of global warming, would inundate between 14,000 to 30,000 square kilometres of the coastal regions making up to 15 million people homeless. On 12 November 1970 half a million people died in a night from a flood in Bangladesh (then known as East Pakistan) when Cyclone Bhola hit the coast. It wasn't unexpected, but there were no adequate ways to warn the population.

As with floods, global climate change feeds into the problem of famines

Famines caused an estimated 70 million deaths during the twentieth century. Starvation is the characteristic of some people not having enough food to eat. It is not the characteristic of there being not

enough food to eat. As with floods, global climate change also feeds into the problem of famines. At present an astonishing one-third of all the primary crops grown in fields is lost or wasted and not consumed. In high-income countries, retailers or consumers who throw out surplus food before it is eaten waste most. Have you visited Real Junk Food Project (TRJFP) cafe at All Hallows' church, Hyde Park?

here are over 100 instances of the Hebrew word for "famine" in scripture. Famines are among the most significant natural events reported in the Bible, and have major impacts on many Biblical families. Famines are often, though of course not always, caused by drought: an instance is in the time of Elijah, when three years without rain led to famine (1 Kings 17.1 - 18.45).

Famines are often a factor in causing migrations to places where there is more food. Abraham (Genesis 12.10) and Jacob (Genesis 46.5-7) both moved their families to Egypt to avoid famine in Canaan. Ruth 1.1-2 records that Elimelek and Naomi moved to Moab in Transjordan to escape a famine.

Ford's Focus

John's Gospel Part Seven: The Great Question

This month, Steve Ford's regular Bible Study in John's Gospel reaches chapter 5, verses 24 -47.

hat we have seen and focused on in the previous chapters is Jesus. We saw John always pointing Jesus out to those around him, Mary pointing Jesus out as the answer to no wine, Nicodemus's enquiring spirit that was searching for truth, the Samaritan women who was so excited when she met Jesus that she told all around her to "come see a man who told me everything I ever did", to the man here in John 5



whose encounter with Jesus gave him legs.

What are we going to do with Jesus? Are we going to embrace him and his teachings and believe?

Here in John 5 verses 24 - 47 we find Jesus in the spotlight, Jesus declaring that he is in fact God in man. Well, this really angered those religious leaders so much that they wanted to kill him. The question we have to ask here is, what do I do with Jesus? Do I want to continue in my ignorance and let him just carry on teaching people and hope it doesn't get out of hand or do I want to embrace and enjoy what he is doing: changing lives?

This is the great question and challenge that Jesus lays down here in John 5 to the religious leaders of the day. They were so wrapped up in "religion" that it had paralysed their spiritual senses and understanding, so much so that they saw Jesus as a threat and failed to see and accept him as the one sent from God that they had read and taught about.

esus sums the situation up with the following words in verses 38-40 (NKJV) "But you do not have his word abiding in you, because whom He sent, Him you do not believe. You search the scriptures, for in them you

think you have eternal life: and these are they which testify of me. But you are not willing to come to me that you may have life."

So before we move on with our study in John let us just pause for a

moment and consider this man Je-



sus, this man who came into our sinful world with the sole aim of changing lives. What are we going to do with him? Are we going to embrace him and all his radical teachings and believe, by faith, that he is the answer and point him out in the crowd? Or are we going to be like the religious leaders of the day and intellectually and physically reject him, to the point that we condemn him to death in our lives as

not relevant and thereby separate ourselves from all that God has for us as individuals and as communities?

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Warming Warning

It is reported that eleven top scientists have described the Paris agreement as offering a false hope. One of them has said that the prospects for global warming are now dire.

hen the universe was created and God said "let there be light", a set of natural forces were formed that obey laws capable of mathematical expression. Among these are the much neglected laws of all forms of mechanics and of thermodynamics. These confirm the conclusions of the eleven signatories from their separate specialist studies. All forms of energy entering the earth's surface degrade to heat through the end use, human activity.



Some heat is returned to the upper atmosphere by convection and blue green light is radiated into space. Atmospheric pollution decreases this energy loss.

> This problem causes so much misery. Is there a Christian response?

Increasing use of energy leads inevitably to a slow increase in the average temperature at the earth's surface. This increase is small compared with short term variations from several other causes, but is dominant in the longer term. It is important because a small increase in temperature produces a large response to the heat generated motion and composition of the world climate. Storms, floods, droughts and wild fires become more severe. This has now become apparent.

It is difficult to see more than two possible solutions. We need to



reduce energy consumption and increase outward radiation. Green energy is helpful only if it results in a reduced use of fossil energy. It seems unlikely that atmospheric pollution can be reduced with an increased use of energy.

Is there a Christian response to a problem that causes so much misery? We assert that it is God's universe. We are to care for his creation. In Genesis we have images to demonstrate the challenging theology of The Fall. A people walking with God living in the Garden of Eden who chose to eat of the tree of knowledge and had their eyes on the tree of life, are expelled from the garden.

Anthropology confirms that migrants from the west combining with people in the Garden of Eden finally moved east from Lake Van to spread over the Middle East. The human race has chosen to decide what is right and what is wrong. It no longer regards life as the gift of God and few of us walk in the light of the Holy Spirit. The scriptural input from past generations towards compassion in Britain is being replaced by consumerism.

it is God we trust. This requires us in duty and love to demonstrate in word and action that in Jesus we have the only hope for ourselves and our neighbours. On the practical level, do we not have a Christian duty to reduce our own energy use in heating, lighting and travel?


