It seems cruel to disturb them. They look so peaceful resting side by side under the redundant wooden blind slats and the rather useless plastic shelves. All four tyres are flat, and the chains are rusty, so Le Grand Départ will not be departing from our shed any time soon. Even if we wanted to, I'm not sure that either of us would get far.

I can only speak personally, but I've not ridden a bike for over two years, and that was my grandson's, in a field where the landing was soft. He wasn't impressed, and neither were my knees. It's questions of balance and breath that defeat me, not to mention the fear of traffic and potholes.

Our "get-out-of-jail-free" card is a borrowed exercise bike which sits on our landing. It goes nowhere of course, and to be honest it makes a better clothes horse than a velocipede. All promise but no

action! A bit like church sometimes – static spirituality to be engaged in privately, when we get round to it. It's a shame, because I used to love cycling – there's hardly a place in County Durham where I haven't pedalled as a teenager.



A month before the nation celebrates Le Grand Départ the church around the world will have enjoyed The Biggest Birthday Party Ever. When the Holy Spirit came on the first followers of Jesus he confirmed all that Jesus had said and done, and the Jesus Message of his death for

our salvation and his raising from the dead became personal to each one in a new and living way. Most Christians know the narrative. Spiritual balance and breath were all taken care of by God himself, whatever the surrounding traffic of a pagan world.

Around the UK there are many relics of Holy Spirit birthday celebrations – histories of revivals, church buildings constructed to house hundreds and thousands, stories of firebrand preachers and even reports of collections of “revival trophies”. (One chapel I heard of was reputed to have a whole room of prosthetic limbs and walking aids which were no longer required following the outpourings of God’s Spirit).

But in so many places the tyres are now flat, the church unable to ride out with confidence in the message and power of the Gospel. So many communities of believers are not

sure that God still does stuff like he used to.

Whatever Le Tour will do for us in the longer term it’s certainly had the effect of getting people on to their bikes. There has never been such a shameless display of Lycra! My prayer is that this Pentecost we might have the courage to liberate those memories we have of what the Lord can do, testimonies of the Holy Spirit’s work stored somewhere in our collective faith sheds. We won’t need to pump the tyres up. Divine breath is enough to enliven us and get us ready to roll. As King David prayed all those years ago:

“Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me. Do not cast me from your presence or take your Holy Spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of your salvation and grant me a willing spirit, to sustain me”. (Psalm 51.10-12)

Thinking About Science?

Science raises some issues that Christians, and often the church in general, can find difficult or be ill equipped to address. Modern

science can change very quickly and ideas develop beyond recognition. Also science can raise deep moral questions that are very difficult to answer. Genetically modify food crops or let growing populations starve?

Christians in Science have produced a series of “Thinking About” leaflets on these issues that are written by Christians who are professional scientists. They are specifically designed to help Christians who do not have a scientific background to better understand the relevant science, and any difficulties that it presents for the Christian. Each leaflet outlines the basic science behind the issue, how it relates to the Biblical Christian understanding of the world, and suggests some other resources for those who want to take it further.

And in any case the theist could argue that a multiverse requires a “universe generator” which has to produce just the right kind of law-governed universes so that one or more of them contain life...

visit to the UK, and we are planning for Charis to be baptised here this time round.

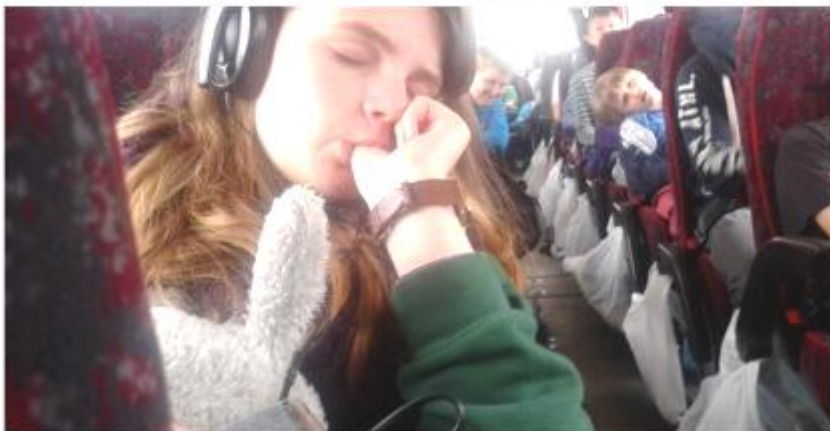

News from BMS World Mission

Church Treasurer, Adrian Howe, recently received this letter from the treasurer of BMS World Mission

Dear Mr Howe

Thank you for the support your church has given to the work of BMS World Mission over the past year. We ended the financial year on 31 October 2013 with the financial books balanced, and we thank God for his provision, expressed through the faithfulness of church fellowships like your own who support world mission through BMS.

In our recently published vision document *The Highest Goal* we have set out our vision for mission:

The highest goal of all we do is to bring people to faith in our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ and an experience of the abundant life that only he can provide.

How is this goal fulfilled by BMS in practice? It is shown in the mission activities, and the care for those

who are suffering and marginalised, that feature in BMS projects. To give just a few examples:

Chad: Our medical personnel at Guinebor II Hospital are saving lives among a desperately poor community. Witness to their Christian faith is a key part of the hospital's ministry to the surrounding Muslim community through prayer by

Christian staff, showing the Jesus film to patients and visitors, and supporting a Chadian hospital chaplain.



Uganda: Christian lawyers are enabling a powerless community to

reclaim their land, and agricultural training has led to an increase in harvests. At the heart of these developments is the local church, through which all this support is given. As a result, the church has grown and its role in the community strengthened.



Syrian refugees: In Lebanon, vital food supplies have been distributed to Syrian refugees through the local church. This evidence of practical love and care has prompted many refugees to explore the meaning of the Christian faith.

subject in its correct context and who are ready for God's surprises”.

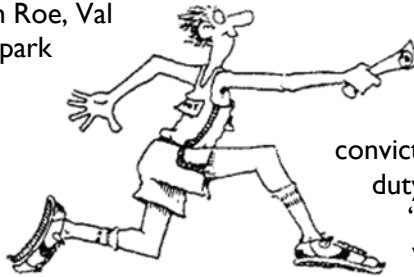

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A Taste of Italy

There was a hive of activity in the Green House on 3 May as we decorated the room in red, white and green for the forthcoming Pizza and Pud evening to raise funds and awareness of the plight of thousands of asylum seekers and refugees in Italy.

It was a real joy and privilege to welcome David and Ann as our special guests

These dear folk pay approx €3,000 each to traffickers who put them into a boat and take them out into Italian waters and then leave them. Many have been found dehydrated and hungry, with only the clothes on their backs. They are mostly male but recently included more females with young children or preg-

nant, willing to face possible death to secure a better life for themselves in the west.

David and Ann MacFarlane our church partners in Reggio Calabria in southern Italy work alongside other groups to try to support these folk. Hence this fundraiser, to help them financially provide some

of their basic necessities, when living rough with no electricity, water and accommodation. The Italian authorities give each one registered some aid for three days then after that they are on their own, depending on the generosity of others unless they can find some work.

It was a real joy and privilege to be able to have as our special guests, David and Ann, as they are on home assignment. After a quiz “al Italian” 10 questions on Italy and 10 about the MacFarlanes themselves, Ann showed a PowerPoint presentation of some of their work. Highlighting the desperate needs of the area, the whole council of 19 members has been sacked. Rubbish is mounting in the streets and as the season gets hotter, the threat of vermin is quite high.

Alongside the needs of refugees they also have the needs of their Italian/Philippino church members, many of whom are poor and in low paid jobs. Praise the Lord there have been some recent new members and baptisms in the church.

I just want to say a big “thank you” to all who made this possible: the deacons for financial support towards the food for the meal, those who helped with shopping and preparing the meal, provided cakes and those who have given generously and sacrificially.

Never Give Up Serving

Chris Gnanakan is our Mission Partner in the USA working with church leaders in Asia with the organisation OTAN. He writes: "The Gnanakans will be in Leeds two Sundays in June (22nd & 29th)! I will be working with (for) Brian on the details of our stay and ministry while with you. My initial thoughts are to do a series called: "Equipped2Serve" and discuss four tools (Prayer, the Word, Gifts and Suffering!) God has given us to serve one another and to reach out to those without Christ. Here's a message I wrote with you all on my mind"

I Thessalonians 2

Have you felt like giving up lately? What keeps you going? It must be a meaningful relationship that encourages you and you care to cultivate. When someone becomes "very dear" to you, as the Thessalonians had to Paul, it becomes natural to share life's joys and struggles with them (1 Thessalonians 2.8). A good relationship can "spark off", but strong, significant and lasting ones take time to build and maintain. Here great need can cause tremendous growth. What does this investment look like? Paul paints four pictures for us that help us serve together and not give up in tough times:

A Consistent Steward (2.1–6)

The basic, essential requirement of a steward is to be faithful with regard to:

- Guarding the Gospel
- Serving Christ's body
- Caring for God's family members.

Trustworthy stewards willingly endure hardship. They use honest methods with pure motives, never for personal gain. Paul gave praise publicly where due, but didn't fall for flattery.

A Caring Mother (2.7–8)

Paul gave himself in the service to others, like a “nursing mother” (2.7). We must offer younger disciples TLC (Tender, Loving Care). It is crucial we feed new believers with milk and honey (1 Peter 2.2; Psalm 119.3) before they can help themselves with bread and meat (Matthew 4.4; 1 Corinthians 3.1-4)

A Concerned Father (2.9–16)

Paul perceived the problem in “Bible” churches and chided: “You have many teachers but few fathers” (1 Corinthians 4.15). Children look for heroes. If their fathers aren't spiritual role models, they find others, but often in the wrong places! Fathers lead by example, not force. With sacrifice, hard-earned money (2.6) and tough love, they both warn and encourage.

A Compassionate Brother (2.17–20)

The local church is a fellowship of “brothers and sisters” where service time is family time. The word com-passion literally means

Paul couldn't wait to see his family again. But there was someone else all true believers longed to see again: the Lord Jesus!

“to suffer with”. So, away from church, Paul felt like an “orphan”! He prayed for, corresponded with and couldn't wait to see his family again. There was someone else Paul and all true believers longed to see, again – the Lord Jesus!

Conclusion

Think: What an honour and privilege to be a trustee of the Gospel that changes people, forever!

Questions: In what ways do you “love on” new attendees and nurture younger disciples at our church?

A mentor has gone where you want to go, and can help you get there! Do you have one? Why/why not?

What's the best way to be ready for Christ's second coming? Keep serving one another in love, and loving the lost to Christ!

Cragg Matters

Working Across the Churches in Horsforth

Duncan Stow explains his role with Churches Together in Horsforth and how his vision for the area fits in with his work at Cragg Hill.

For the son of a Methodist, married to a Catholic, who came to faith in an Anglican church, was nurtured through university by a Baptist church, before being sent out to the mission field by a Pentecostal missionary society, Christian unity has always felt very important but also very natural.

Church life is busy as is life generally which means it is always a challenge to balance what we do as a local church and what we do as the extended family of churches together. Getting the right balance though is worth working out because the opportunities of working together are great and the witness it brings - "people will know you

are my disciples by how you love one another" - is powerful.

Here in Horsforth, there are rich pickings from the fruit tree of Christian unity: Horsforth Live At Home, Primary School Assemblies teams, Hope/Carols in the Park events, a Farmers' Market, and a Foodbank outlet to name a few. All of these gently but confidently speak of the goodness of God to our community as well as to the church.

I have heard the church's position in our society likened to the people of God exiled in Babylon, living in a foreign land with different rules, no longer the people of power able to express their voice but called to adapt, to change whilst staying faithful to our God and His ways. Exile is seen as a place of crisis. Crisis can be defined by two words: danger and opportunity. The danger is

we give in and say that's just the way it is now. The opportunity is that with new circumstances come new ways to reflect the love of God to the people He gives us to love.

There are new opportunities to be people of influence sharing the good news of Christ if we adapt and work together

In exile rather than being a people who hold power we become a people who influence through our lives being salt and light, bringing fresh flavour to those around us and making them hungry for more. Daniel never shirked from worshipping His God in Babylon but he also never shirked from wanting to serve the community he found himself in.

For Cragg the opportunity of Crisis has been a greater willingness in us and other churches to work together in order to impact Horsforth. Many from Cragg play lead roles in outworking that mission. Our unity in Christ and our commitment to our community by working together is

proving attractive and bearing fruit.

For instance, recently I was approached by Horsforth Children's Services as a representative of churches to be the deliverer of two pieces of youth work. A couple of months later, a churches team host 30 children a week at Brownlee Stone centre and also run a weekly music project in the Cragg recording studio. Cragg Hill was later packed to standing room only for a showcase event of the talents of those who had benefited from the project.

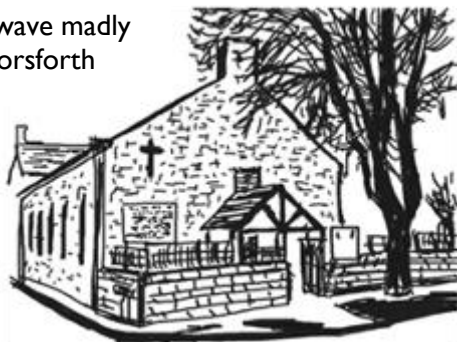
The encouragement for me was that the Horsforth Children's services approached us, trusted us and have helped us to serve and love young people, something I honestly believe the church does better than anyone else.

It is a fruit of the confidence and the warmth in which the church is being received here in Horsforth. I love Farmers' Market days, not just because I know it will be dry when my day starts at 7am putting out stalls but because of the buzz of people being together. But I am not the only one who loves it. I recently visited the local shops who without



exception said it was the best day of their month, the only regret of one was that she was so busy she couldn't get to visit the market herself.

School children wave madly at us all over Horsforth because they love the fact we get dressed up in costume and tell them great stories from the Bible, and schools willingly promote our shared events because they think they are good news.



As the people of God perhaps we are exiled, removed from the privileged position we once held society, but there are new opportunities to be people of influence sharing the good news of Christ if we adapt. I am convinced that working together is part of the adapting that we need to persevere with.

A Week in the Life of...

27 April - 3 May

Sunday

The week starts with an early morning walk and then some final preparations before I head off to Cragg, where I'm warmly greeted by Duncan Stow (who I've known for about 15 years). A visit to Cragg wouldn't be complete without a hug from Patty, who duly obliges, and the service gets underway. My title for the sermon is "Jesus: the one and only" and I'm focusing on Luke 24.40: "Jesus showed them his hands and feet".

In the evening I'm at SENT and Claire Ginn is speaking about grace and reminds us "All day every day we need Jesus". She plays a song by a friend of hers and the words are powerful:

*I turn away
From all that takes Your place
Ignores the cross
And cheapens costly grace
I sought Your hand
But now I seek Your face.
For You
More, more, more than anything, Jesus*

I leave just before the end in order to meet for prayer with some of my neighbours from other churches. We pray for one another's needs and especially for the people in our neighbourhood to come to know the love of Jesus for themselves.

Monday

Today is my monthly Retreat day. Having spent most of my ministry being "too busy" to take regular time out for spiritual renewal I made a commitment when I started at SPBC a year ago that I would block out a day at the end of each month for that purpose. The form varies but I focus this time on re-newing my Induction vows, writing in my journal, reading, meditating and intercession.

In the evening I join with some of the Rooted team to listen to Steve Hoey from Canopy, a self-help community housing project based in inner-city Leeds who renovate derelict houses to create decent homes for people that are homeless. Having started with a wheelbarrow and £5 they now have 100 people in 55 houses and their staff

My son is off school having been vomiting and retching the night before and again in the morning, so I'm glad of the flexibility to work from home as well as look after him. I catch up on emails, do some sermon preparation and have a long phone call with Brian about "Mission North of the Ring Road". In the evening it's the Elders' meeting at Val Dooks' where there's further discussion and prayer about Mission Northside and Val spoils us with her sumptuous homemade cakes when we break for refreshments.

Friday

Day off!

The "Green House of Prayer" is normally the highlight of my week as we meet across the Mission Communities to seek God together. We begin by reflecting on

Isaiah 55 and use those verses to launch into adoration of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are joined this morning by David and Ann MacFarlane. David is due to lead the service at Swarcliffe the next day and was planning on using the same passage which is a confirmation for him and an encouragement to us! We pray as the Holy Spirit leads us with a focus on David and Ann and their work with BMS.

The afternoon is taken up with producing flyers for Café Church and the Internship scheme and then more sermon preparation for the service the next day at Adel Mission Community as we work through our church vision statement. This week we're looking at "being passionate followers of Christ".

In the evening I'm back in the Green House for the Pizza and Pud fundraiser that Pat Dalglish has organised for destitute asylum seekers in Rosarno (see page 16).

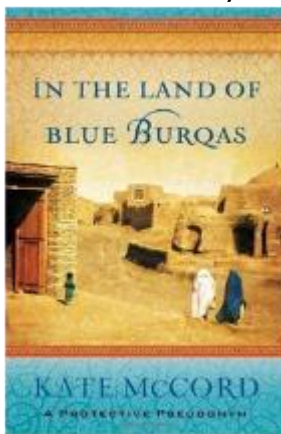
In the Land of Blue Burqas by Kate McCord

Why do we read what we read? Some Christians limit themselves to devotional books, Bible notes and commentaries. Does this keep us fully in the world? And are secular works consistent with being not of the world? They often tell a story of people who practise some of the fruits of the spirit and of some who do not. Secular literature is not usually neutral. There was a time when many homes had just two books, The Bible and Pilgrim's Progress. Do you have a book which might stand now, as Bunyan's allegory of the walk to faith and in obedience did centuries earlier? For the first time, for me I think the answer is yes.

Kate McCord, a protective pseudonym, records five years of witness in Afghanistan. She writes of her own path to faith and how she worked with an NGO often at

personal risk on projects to support women in rural areas, for which certificates and stamps were required from officials.

There is brief reference to the history of Afghanistan from the first



liberal, left leaning elected government through a series of damaging international interventions to the current expectation of a return of extremism. The rural world she describes is not unlike descriptions elsewhere of life in three major cities, but all seem worlds away from

national politics. It has yet to be seen whether wide support for the electoral process will make any change to the life of most Afghans.

She was able to speak of her faith in the teaching of Jesus. She writes, "I saw how wonderfully revolutionary Jesus is and how amazingly beautiful."

Her colleagues were mainly Afghans. Individual projects required permits and stamps from unhelpful, often corrupt officials against a background of frequent claims that she was an American agent.

She had to convince the people she went to help, that her salary and all costs including gifts of blankets for the poor came from herself and her Baptist church in America. She listened with respect before offering comment and questions. The questions were returned so she was able to speak of her faith in the teaching of Jesus. And she knew her Bible. She writes, "I saw how wonderfully revolutionary Jesus is and how amazingly beautiful."

By sharing hospitality and conversations mostly with women, she was able to demonstrate that Islamic concepts of God, prayer, judgment and authority have no common ground



with Christianity. There are many books on Afghanistan portraying the endemic violence, corruption and tyrannies, but only this gives voice to the people, mainly women, of what Islam requires of them.

Toleration of dissent is to them incomprehensible. Authority rests with the mosques. The scriptures are memorised in a foreign language, Arabic, without understanding. The concept of the Holy Spirit is incomprehensible in a culture of obedience to rules in order to obtain merit with God, but it shows how the words and teaching of "The Honourable Master Jesus" can be made real in loving dialogues. These covered being grateful instead of grumbling, forgiveness replacing resentment, love expelling hate, all leading to a different recognition of the greatness of God, which provoked discussion and often led to agreement. And the strap line? This is what Jesus taught.

It tells of a truly astonishing pilgrimage. The author was warned of the imminent danger of kidnapping, disappearance and death. She fled leaving everything behind.

Step of Faith

My Journey

My journey to faith began in South Parade's Sunday School many years ago.

I was too shy to do anything about it. Communion then came at the end of the service when, during a short break, those who were not members were expected to leave and the rest then shared communion together.

This caused me great heartache. Today I love to hear that everyone is

welcome to stay and those who are not yet ready to take the bread and wine are reminded that Jesus loves them and died for them too.

The other thing I clearly remember was during a time when we were without a minister and so different people preached for us. One of these was Rev Puttock who worked for the YBA. He had a wonderful speaking voice and during one sermon he read the poem by Francis Thompson called "The Hound of Heaven". In archaic language it describes a man trying to escape from



God and his call on his life. Wherever he runs or tries to hide, God is following. Finally he realises that there is no escape and no peace and so he submits to God's call on his life. WOW. This was one of those moments we have sometimes when we feel the message is aimed at us and this was for me.

Life is never a steady journey and I have been through difficult times but God is faithful and during these times we learn to trust him more

For years I'd been running away and all I got was misery and a lack of peace in my life. Eventually David Green was called to lead the church and I was challenged. That was all I needed and so I was baptised and publicly made my commitment to Jesus – the best day of my life.

Life is never a steady journey and I personally, and the church too, have been through difficult times but God is faithful and during these times we learn to trust him more.

When I retired early from teaching and was praying for direction about other work, God listened and answered again. I was asked by the church whether I would help with the pastoral work. David Morris was working on his own and the church was growing. What an answer to prayer. This was the start of the Ministry Team as we know it and as God has blessed us we have been able to strengthen the work by calling others too.

I feel hugely blessed to be a part of a church like SP with its vision and commitment to "build community in Christ". My church family has been an encouragement and support over many years.

Today we are blessed by a growing number of younger people. I feel very strongly that we should always be looking out for any who may be finding it difficult to take that first step and who just need someone to help them as I was helped.

The Football Country and the Church

Kleos Cesar and his family returned home to Brazil in 2007 after living in Leeds for four years while Kleos studied at Leeds University. They worshipped at South Parade, and Kleos played in the Headingley Music Group and helped to produce this magazine. We asked him to share some thoughts on life in Brazil as the World Cup approaches, and how the church is preparing for this massive event.

“I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people — for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness”
(1 Timothy 2.1-2 NIV)

From 12 June this year, 11 men (and several more supporting) each from 32 countries, appropriately dressed in colours representing their population, will be chasing a ball. After 64 matches of 90 minutes each, the best team

(perhaps) will be declared champion with much confetti, fireworks and honours. This mega-event takes place every 4 years in a country previously chosen and supposedly prepared to host the tournament. This year (just like in 1950, when Brazil lost the championship against its neighbour Uruguay), the country where I was born and live, will host the games. There is generally a mixture of joy and worry about it.

Brazil is experiencing economic growth and the consolidation of its democracy after 21 years of military dictatorship that began 50 years ago. The beautiful teenage “football country” is learning to live in a democracy. Because of corruption, unfortunately still very active in this great and blessed tropical land, we suffer serious social problems. Public health is abandoned. Hospitals are sick, starved of funds. Education suffers with increasingly meagre budgets. Underpaid teachers give up their vocation for a better chance to buy things or

happiness. Drug trafficking controls certain regions of the peripheries. Some policemen, poorly trained and poorly paid, are eventually caught supporting the crime in exchange for a wage supplement. That is unacceptable.

Many political demonstrations have been taking place against the realisation of the World Cup. The Brazilian government is expecting to spend R\$25 billion (approximately £8 billion) in the refurbishment of football stadiums and the expansion of the airport and other infrastructure. In June 2013 millions of people expressed their dissatisfaction with the government on the streets.

For the first time in my life, I see the press reporting that a significant part of the population will not support the green and yellow team, under the main claim that “we do not need more world cups. We need education, health and security”. I agree and add (when talking to my students): “We need to revise our concepts, our consumerist attitudes, our Christian origins and values”. I guess Brazil is no longer the “football country”.

This tropical, naturally gorgeous and sunny country, whose population is

fun, talkative and friendly, will soon be visited by thousands of foreign visitors. People are aware that this is a good opportunity to treat them well, to invite them back to enjoy our landscape and our friendship.

People complain that there is a church on every corner. Many cinemas in the country have been turned into churches.

The Christian church is growing significantly, particularly evangelical churches. According to IBGE (Brazilian Institute of Geography and Statistics), evangelicals have already reached 22.2% of a 200 million population (3.7 million of which are Baptists, in 6,000 churches, according to the 2010 official census). “There is a church on every corner”, complain the sceptics. Churches which were small and simple until a few years ago are being expanded and renovated. Prime areas of cities are acquired and big churches built on them. Many cinemas in the country have been turned into churches. This is all awesome! Looks like good news doesn’t it? It is and is not.



On the one hand many homeless people and drug users are widely being assisted by a cluster of churches in the capitals (particularly in the city of São Paulo); but on the other hand some non-believers openly wonder why the water levels of the moral reservoir are increasingly found to be so low.

Despite some controversy and some rejection, the Church (in its many denominations) prepares for various campaigns of evangelisation of Brazilian and foreign football lovers. For example the Igreja Batista do Amor (Baptist Church of Love) and several others launched a

campaign against sexual exploitation during the world championship. Churches in the host cities are preparing services and activities in English. Foreigners will be invited to participate in their programmes during the World Cup, welcomed to one of our famous barbecues... Many activities are being prepared and it is beautiful to see brothers and sisters at work to let others know about Jesus.

Several other campaigns are planned in several regions of Brazil with a view to evangelisation and communion among our brothers and sisters.

Some smaller churches, away from the big centres, like the one I attend (Igreja Presbiteriana Vale do Sol), are preparing something simpler: we will watch the games on the church's big screen, accompanied by free meals. The whole neighbourhood is being invited to participate.

Please pray for the various campaigns and the day-to-day testimonies of every Christian who treads this blessed ground.

Thanks for this opportunity to share my thoughts at this time. We miss you.

Recommended Reads 2

Faith and Wisdom in Science by Tom McLeish

Tom McLeish is Professor of Physics and Pro-Vice-Chancellor for Research at Durham University. He is also a Reader in the Church of England. Before the post at Durham he was Professor of Physics at Leeds University. It was during discussions with both clergy and lay people in urban and rural parishes of Yorkshire that it first became apparent to Tom that the church had need of a theology of science rather than to stand merely a bewildered observer of a battle between theology and science.

*This world-class physicist
makes no attempt to hide
his deep Christian faith*

Faith and Wisdom in Science challenges much of the current “science and religion” debate as operating with the wrong assumptions and in the wrong space. Tom has also discussed much of the content of the

book in a series of lectures, including one at South Parade. Those who missed Tom at SPBC can hear him again at a conference at Leeds Trinity University from 4 - 6 September.

The book is divided into 8 chapters reaching a climax with a Theology of Science via the Book of Job and the New Testament creation narratives. A major feature of Tom's work is that he is not just interested in the creation narratives found in Genesis but also in others found in the Bible. He recommends that scientists read the last part of Job; they will find that it asks many deep questions. They will also enjoy reading the thoughts of a world-class physicist who makes no attempt to hide his deep Christian faith.

Questions

To End All Wars?

As the commemorations for the hundredth anniversary of the start of World War One begin, Cyril Snell considers how his own family was affected by the conflict.

In 1914, Brixham in South Devon was a small, but busy fishing port. The same families had lived there for generations and most of the men were seafaring or employed in work allied to the sea, such as boat building. On the day war broke out, my Uncle Harry was on a Merchant Navy ship in Bremen. It was illegally detained and he

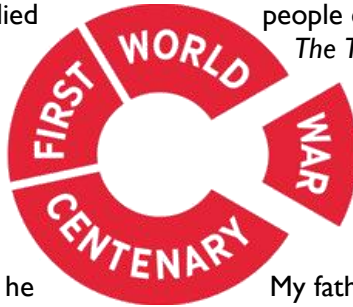
became a prisoner of war for the next four years, sustained by the Red Cross parcels which dominated the lives of his younger siblings.

It was not until 1916 that British people came to know, courtesy of *The Times*, the true cost in lives of resisting the Germans. I was born ten years later, but the reality of that war dominated my childhood.

My father's brother was so disturbed by his life in the trenches that he was sectioned when I was seven. My mother's brother-in-law was torpedoed and the period in the water awaiting rescue left him with damaged lungs.

Granny often told the story of the



parade when volunteers left by train. We had a Regatta every year. Captain Marden of the Yacht Club who never went to sea, was the chief organiser. Two men who were off to join the Admiralty tugs, considered safer and better paid, called out to him "Hold the Regatta till we get back. This won't take long." They were both drowned within the year.

One uncle in the Merchant Navy, sailing to and from America was discharged during the ship's repair and refit. He was seen returning home and within a day was presented with the "white feather". Grandad told him to go back to Liverpool and sleep

on the ship until it was recommissioned.

The deeper reality circles around the concepts and the lessons, neither learnt nor understood. Patriotism, Volunteers or Conscripits, Causes of War, War to end Wars, League of Nations, Collective Security, Pacifism, Betrayal, Homes fit for Heroes, all tumble through my head whenever WWI is mentioned. I have strong opinions on all of these. People who do not learn from history are doomed to repeat ancient follies.

Preaching Themes and Readings

Ascension and Pentecost

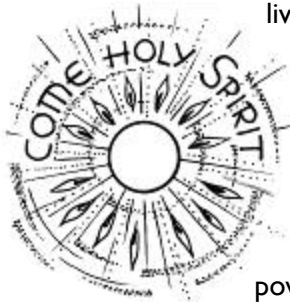
The first two weeks of June help us to think about the Ascension of Jesus and the outpouring of the Spirit at Pentecost with readings from Acts 1 and 2, Isaiah 35, Ephesians 4.1-16, Colossians 2.6-12 and Luke 3.1-20

Christians have a range of understandings about the work of the Holy Spirit based on a spectrum of Biblical interpretations and this will no doubt be reflected in the different ways preachers address

the topic. Whatever view we adopt, the promise is that God does not leave us to try to live our Christian lives alone, but chooses to

live in us in the Person of the Holy Spirit and through his presence in us is able to equip us to serve effectively in mission. No one doctrine can contain the awesome

power and provision of God in and for us. In simple terms we need to keep our doors and windows open to him – we never know when the Divine breath will blow through us in fresh ways.



Colossians

Morning preaching from 15 June to the end of July centres on the book of Colossians under a general title of "A faith worth having".

*God promises to live in us
in the Person of the Holy
Spirit and equip us to
serve effectively in mission*

Colossae was a town in Asia Minor, east of Ephesus. As often happened a group of false teachers had infiltrated the Christian community and so Paul writes to correct their teaching. The heart of his reply is that Jesus Christ is able to give full salvation. In his writing he teaches clearly about Jesus' Divinity and how the whole of creation depends on his saving and sustaining power.

Typically he rounds it off with practical advice for everyday witness and paints an exciting picture of the kind of church that really loves Jesus.

The Purpose Driven Life

In the evenings we are continuing through Rick Warren's classic, *What on earth am I here for? - the purpose driven life*. One recent commentator describes how we have a "discipleship deficit" in the UK church. We have a wealth of good teaching and fellowship resources

and yet we still struggle to produce consistent followership of Jesus.

Warren draws from Scripture with some memorable images to help us focus on how we can honour God and find robust purpose in our lives.

Small Groups

Sunday evening themes are also taken further in Small Group material which is made available to every cell/home/study/small group (different names for same activity) on a weekly basis. Some groups look at alternative material from time to time to suit their particular needs, but the main material continues to be produced for those who wish to use it.
